



The weather was kind to Luckett villagers, friends and family carolling on the bridge, before they retired to the social club for further singing and seasonal refreshments, including mince pies, Alison's excellent home-made Christmas sausage rolls (with cranberry and brie, or chorizo and fennel) and mulled wine, all expertly served by Danny and Sheila.

Nigel gave a rendition of the muchloved early 1800s poem "'Twas the Night

Before Christmas", which was well received. Special pieces by The Wheal Martha Band included a saxophone arrangement of "Winter Wonderland", "Santa Baby" and the very lively "Feliz Navidad".

Jodie Struck had travelled up from Truro to talk about the work of (possibly Cornwall's oldest charity) "iSight", founded in 1856. She told how their services are free to all Cornish residents and the charity aims to support all who are affected by sight loss to lead active, independent and involved lives. Jodie brought along some very useful aids to show us, including a small audio device that hooks over a cup when making a hot drink to avoid scalding and overfilling - simple but very effective.

A slightly different line-up of the band played a similar "Christmas Celebration" a few days later at The Honicombe Arms, Honicombe Holiday Park with euphonium player Catherine joining us. Thank you to hosts, Matt and Denise Martin.

A collection was made at both festive evenings when everyone gave very generously and raised a fantastic total of £425.03 for the charity.

These are the notes submitted directly by the Parish Council Clerk. There have been no amendments or edits made to this text and are included within this edition of the OSN with the caveat that they are not formal minutes of the recent Parish Council meeting; it was however felt that the information contained would be of interest to the OSN readers.

Stoke Climsland Parish Council

The Parish Council has decided to set an increase in the Precept for 2025-6 in line with inflation at 3.95%. This equates to 5p extra per week for a band D property.

The Neighbourhood Development Plan will be

brought to the Council at its meeting on 20th January for their agreement to proceed to the final 6 week consultation by the steering group. All the proposed plan and its evidence base together with the results of all previous consultations will be available. Watch out for the summary leaflet and the invitation to submit your views. Following any adjustments to take those results into account the plan will be submitted to Cornwall Council who will then take it through the final steps to a referendum of the Parish.

The successful Carbon Zero Homes Project is still attracting attention from many parts of the country with other larger councils asking to use either our business model or to use the Retrofit Animation, which you can see at: Stoke Climsland Carbon Zero Homes Project - YouTube. It explains in simple terms the ways you can make your home warmer, healthier and save money at the same time.

The Council is also working with Cornwall Council and local landowners to keep the footpaths open and usable across the parish. They recognise the health benefits and enjoyment many of you get from being able to walk in our beautiful countryside and have done extra work to several of the routes in the last couple of years.

Over the last few years, they have installed new grit bins to supplement those that were originally in place and dog waste bins, which they pay Cornwall Council to empty, helping to keep our countryside a pleasant place to be.

There will be an election for all 10 seats on the Parish Council on 1st May. There are already two vacancies as there have been resignations. Do you have ideas that might bring improvements to the Parish, could you give some time to keeping Stoke Climsland such a great place to live? If you are interested and would like to know more, please talk to the Parish Clerk.

Start the new year with free weekly walks in Tamar Valley National Landscape



National Landscapes are the perfect places to find peace and fresh air this winter.

The Tamar Valley, just one of 46 National Landscapes throughout the UK, is no exception, with scenic woodland and breathtaking river views to enjoy, and rich mining heritage to discover.

Our three, free, weekly walking groups offer the chance to explore areas within

Tamar Valley National Landscape that you may not be familiar with, as well as places a little further afield. Spend time in Nature, boost your wellbeing and meet new people with the latest

programmes that cover the next three months.

Every Monday, Wednesday and Thursday morning, our qualified walk leaders will help you to discover new routes in the Tamar Valley and beyond, or revisit old favourites. Most walks last around two hours, and range from 2 to $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles in length. They often include a coffee stop part way round or at the end.



The Saltash Walk & Talk group meet every Monday at 10:30am. Walk along footpaths and fields from Latchbrook to Trematon, enjoy a circular walk around St Mellion or stroll around St Germans near the River Lynher. This group also



explores the South West Coast Path, including walks around Mount Batten, Seaton and Wembury this season. If you enjoy walks around formal gardens, a walk around Lanhydrock Estate is planned for 17 March.

On Wednesday mornings, join the Tamar Valley Walk & Talk group. On the Cornish side, they'll explore Calstock, Luckett and Deer Park Farm, with walks on the Devon bank including Weir Quay, Bere Alston, Tavistock, Yelverton and Lopwell. Riding for the Disabled

Very best wishes for a happy 2025!

Another new year! Is it just my imagination, or do they come round more quickly as the years pass? It's not possible to foresee all that the new year will bring, but one thing that will definitely happen this year is that the Duchy College Riding for the Disabled group will continue to offer riding for any people in the area with a physical problem or learning difficulty and whom it's thought that horse riding would help.



In my last column of 2024 I suggested that a very good resolution for 2025 would be to come and visit us during one of our sessions - Duchy College, Wednesday afternoons from 1pm to 3:45ish during College terms - to see what is involved when you volunteer with us. I may also have mentioned that there's usually cake involved!

There are all sorts of different tasks needing to be carried out each session, so there's generally something for everyone. If you're reasonably fit, there's the task of walking beside the rider to make sure they're safe on their horse. One of the side-walkers will also be tasked with giving a brief verbal report on your rider's progress. If you're happy to do so and are used to horses, you may be asked to lead the aforementioned equine.

If you are not so fit you may be asked to act as 'eyes on the ground', which means that you keep a beady eye on the lesson to make sure that there aren't any problems, and report anything that's worrying you to the coach taking the ride. This is necessary because it's not possible for the coach to be watching all the riders at any one time and, above all, we need to ensure that our riders are safe at all times. Another task for the not-so-fit might be to make brief notes of how each rider has got on from information given by one of the side-walkers, as mentioned above. This is very helpful to the coach as, not usually being gifted with eyes in the back of their head (sadly!), as mentioned above, they may not be aware of everything that's happening at any one time.

Another most important task for the not-so-fit is to take charge of one of the horses during the times between the rides so that the leaders and side-walkers can take the opportunity to refresh themselves with a cuppa and maybe a slice of the aforementioned cake. Following the well-known idea that there are no calories in birthday cake, I rather suspect that the same applies to cake eaten during a session of Riding for the Disabled!

Down on the Farm

'Farm Values!'

'What did the Romans ever do for us?' A question often asked when looking back in history - so maybe a modern take should be, as we enter 2025, 'What did farmers ever do for society?'

A new government, keen to implement change and challenged by a fragile economy, have (as alluded to in previous DOTF articles) taken issue with both farming and fellow small businesses: they are intent on removing the long established one hundred percent Inheritance Tax Relief (IHT) allowances on assets for both Agricultural Property Relief (APR) - agricultural land, farmhouse and buildings and Business Property Relief (BPR) - machinery, fixed equipment and livestock values - all capital items essential to running any business and not liquid assets held for investment or personal gain.

Dubbed the 'family farm tax', this proposal is robustly challenged on its potential impact on most farm business family partnerships over the next generation (take note - the HM Treasury figures of just 500 farms being affected are at odds with the industry figures which indicate that up to 75,000 businesses will be affected). These businesses will have to juggle the combination of the reality of continued poor returns and low profits whilst attempting to budget for 10 years of IHT on asset value over 1 million; amongst this they will face further challenges caused by weather extremes and climate change. All of this will undoubtedly stifle any upgrades or reinvestment, curtailing productivity and causing a total loss of confidence for the next generation, thus threatening the very existence of small and medium sized family farms - the backbone of our countryside and rural economy.

So what do we in farming provide that justifies our respected IHT business and property relief allowance over big corporate organisations and private citizens?

Well, apart from the obvious primary purpose of producing a guaranteed supply of home-grow, fully traceable and farm assured safe standard, quantity and quality affordable range of food and drink for a population of 70 million loyal consumers, we also create a landscape by maintaining and enhancing our much celebrated Great British countryside, protecting nature and its wildlife. Such an environment is desired and enjoyed by many local residents, visiting tourists and recreational activities - including runners, hikers, horse riders and dog walkers alike - each taking benefit for health and wellbeing through the extensive public network of footpaths, bridleways and country lanes that crisscross our cropped fields and pastures. Similarly, the often unseen layer of infrastructure to supply rural dwellings and larger towns through gas pipelines, water mains, electric power and telecom poles and masts each on a simple way-leave agreement with the landowner is maintained by the farmers. In recent times, you can add in farmland sites to site renewable energy sites for wind turbines and solar arrays.

Co-operation by the farmer for all these given (and expected) services in many instances also include the receiving and essential spreading under licence of treated sewage sludge from local treatment works. This is, however, under the radar and maybe a less appreciated measured contribution to local communities that many family farms willingly and generously give of their time, resource and support in times of weather crises - ranging from a powerful tractor to rescue a stranded vehicle, a loader bucket to clear snow or blocked drains in a flood, chainsaws and trailers to remove fallen trees across roads or property, to a water pump or generator for standby power at any time of day or night, community events such as extra parking in a nearby field for the local fete, large space barns for group fundraising events, plus year round storage of club and community equipment all free of charge.

Furthermore, farmers often provide public open days for charity, farm walks and school educational visits, scout campsites, tractor / trailers for local carnivals, village bonfires, the list goes on. All of these additional benefits provided by farmers are likely to be threatened by the unintended consequences of a flawed family farm tax. Be careful what you wish for.

Thank you for continuing to support British Farming and understanding the true value of us all 'Down on the Farm'.

Curiosity

It's a new year and many of us will have been tempted to make resolutions. Some of this will have been prompted by tradition, some by expectations from those around us and some because



we like the sense of a fresh start to tackle new goals.

However, such resolutions can bring about a sense of pressure all of their own, particularly if we struggle to maintain them.

So, what might we do instead? Well, how about giving ourselves a gift in the shape of a mental health or wellbeing strategy?

One of the most valuable tools we can start to use is curiosity. This is because our brains have a natural tendency towards the negative side of life. Thousands of years ago, it was a survival strategy; to assume the sound in the bushes was an animal about to eat us was what kept us alive.

This negativity shows itself when we are judgemental towards ourselves and others, when we say 'what on earth did I do that for?', 'what planet are they on?' etc. This actually puts us into the flight or flight response and gets the stress hormones flowing, which we could do without.

Curiosity helps us expand our horizons and adopt a much more open outlook towards ourselves and others. Instead of being judgemental, we could say to ourselves 'I wonder what made me do that?', or 'I wonder why they behaved in that way?'. This changes the way we look at a person or situation completely but, most importantly, it changes the way we look at ourselves and enables us to look at ourselves more compassionately. Plus, this means we are not putting ourselves into the fight or flight response, which is better for our physical and mental health.

Using curiosity can also help us to manage stress. When we notice our stress levels rising, we can ask ourselves 'what can I notice right now?'. This helps us to use our surroundings and notice what our senses are telling us we can see, hear, smell, feel or even taste.

People have used this in situations that they were dreading, such as a hospital appointment. When they were in the waiting room, they simply focussed on what they could see and hear, not analysing or being judgemental about it, simply being an observer of their surroundings. I jokingly tell people to imagine they are David Attenborough and they are making a documentary of that environment, providing the commentary.

Using such a strategy is very mindful and soothing for our brains. It might not dial the stress down to zero but it will dial it down to some degree. The more you use it as a strategy, the better your brain will tune into it and the more effective it will become. You might even notice yourself doing it on automatic pilot and that would show how well it's working for you.

So, why would we do this for ourselves? Well, how has beating yourself up worked for you so far? How might you do things differently in 2025?


